Mr. Goodwin read the resolution recognizing W.A. Dickinson and the history of Dickinson's Store and Mr. Adams and Mr. Purcell presented a framed copy to Mr. Dickinson and his family.

Presentation – Proclaiming September as Childhood Cancer Awareness Month

Mr. Goodwin read the resolution proclaiming September as Childhood Cancer Awareness Month and presented a framed copy to Ms. Amanda Herring.

PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD

Mr. Adams opened the public comment period.

Ms. Linda Glover, Virginia Department of Health, provided a quick update on health and human services resources provided through the Blue Ridge Health District.

Ms. Julie Houston, Louisa District, appeared before the Board to talk about division rights and buffer requirements on a piece property she owns off Ellisville Drive. She noted since buffer requirements were removed by the Board back in February of 2021, she would like for the Board to consider removing the buffer requirement from her property so she can build a new single-family dwelling.

Mr. Robert Dube, Louisa District, thanked the Board for their continuing support of public safety in Louisa County.

Mr. Shane Horn, Cuckoo District, appeared before the Board to thank them for reconsidering the sports complex. He said he would like for the Board to consider improving existing parks and trails. Mr. Horn switched topics and expressed his concerns about an incident that recently occurred in the County. He stated no one on duty from the Sheriff's Office was able to arrive at the scene until at least an hour after the incident occurred because of the call volume that day. He encouraged the Board to increase funding to the Sheriff's Office.

Ms. Vickie Hart, Louisa District, thanked the Board for holding its first workgroup meeting to discuss the flooding concerns in the Town of Louisa. She stated as a member of the Beaver Creek and Tanyard Branch Workgroup, she has concerns because she was unable to hear much of the conversation, which included telephone attendees. She said she has no idea what the exact state of deliverables are for their next meeting or who is accountable, other than staff, for each action item. She said she hopes the information she has requested is provided to her. She talked about the impacts of stormwater runoff from development in the County and encouraged the Board to update the development standards to be more in line with the rest of the state.

Ms. Sue Frunklestit, Patrick Henry District, asked the Board about the status on the \$775,000 the County received from the federal government to build affordable housing and what the Board plans to do with the funding.

With no one else wishing to speak, Mr. Adams closed the public comment period.

INFORMATION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

Discussion – Resolving Remaining Goochland Border Parcels

In 2019 the Counties of Louisa and Goochland made adjustments to the boundary between the two Counties in order to address discrepancies that had impacted those along the boundary for many years. The effort corrected the bulk of the issues for residents along the border, was adopted by the U.S. Census Department, and was used for the recent redistricting process in both counties. At the time of the 2019 boundary adjustment, roughly 10, potentially 11 parcels were

identified that were physically located on one side of that boundary line but taxes by the opposite locality. The intent was to follow up after the Census was complete to correct these anomalies and both Counties are engaging in that process now.

Each locality will have to petition the circuit court for one of the affected localities to approve the Boundary Line Agreement; include facts pertaining to the desire to change or relocate the boundary line and attach GIS map depicting the change in the boundaries of the localities with coordinates a. Each County must file petition by **November 18th**.

Presentation – VDOT Quarterly Update

Mr. Scott Thornton, Louisa Residency Administrator for the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT), presented the VDOT quarterly update, which included an update on projects, construction and maintenance activities, traffic engineering studies, and roads located in the County.

Mr. Thornton further reported on the following project and designs and speed study updates in the County:

- Projects in Development and Preliminary Engineering
- County Safety and Operational Improvements
- Pavement/Resurfacing
- Local Assistance Programs
- Traffic/Engineering Studies
- Maintenance Activities
- Land Use Projects
- Work Orders

Mr. Adams asked for a status update on the Roundabout at Wares Crossroads (Route 208/Route 522).

Mr. Thornton said they are starting on the right-of-way phase and construction is projected to begin in December of 2023.

Presentation – Update from Jaunt

Mr. Ted Riek, Chief Executive Officer, Jaunt, appeared before the Board to provide a brief update on Jaunt resources and transportation services for Louisa County. He touched on Louisa's investment, what it yields in services, and trip purposes for FY22.

Back and forth discussion ensued between the Board and Mr. Riek.

Presentation – Louisa County Water Authority Quarterly Update

Ms. Pamela Baughman, General Manager of the Louisa County Water Authority (LCWA), provided the LCWA Quarterly Update, which included; revenues & expenses; review of the safety manual; maintenance, repairs, & projects; and status updates to the plants and waste water treatment facilities.

Presentation – Update on Belcher Solar from Dominion Energy

Ms. Sarah Marshall, Manager - State and Local Affairs, Dominion Energy, appeared before the Board to provide an update on Belcher Solar. The solar generation facility has been in operation since June of 2021 with the focus on vegetation growth, site reclamation, and maintaining facility operations. The next steps are transitioning wet ponds to dry ponds, which will require inspection and approval, pump-down ponds, removal of sediment, grade and stabilization, conversion of pond structure orifice, and continued vegetation growth. Ms. Marshall noted as they pump-down the ponds and remove sediment, there will be increased turbidity or discoloration of the water.

Back and forth discussion ensued regarding vegetation growth and measures to control erosion or sediment concerns, which were answered by Ms. Marshall.

Mr. Adams asked if Dominion is confident that the conversion of orifices, along with the vegetative growth measures, will address the erosion and sediment concerns at the site.

Ms. Marshall replied yes and explained how the upgraded control measures are already showing minor improvements.

Mr. Barnes shared a video submitted by a landowner who lives adjacent to the solar facility showing continued runoff from the site into the nearby stream.

Ms. Marshall stated Dominion Energy has already seen a difference in runoff but are aware of the continued heavy flow rates. She said from a project perspective, they have seen a difference in flow leaving the project, as well as a difference in turbidity or discoloration of the water. She said everything Dominion has been doing since last year continues to show a transformation. She stated they feel strongly that as they move forward there will be an even greater difference to the site and should resolve any concerns that neighbors of the property may have.

Discussion – 2023 Legislative Platform

Mr. Goodwin briefly went over the Legislative Platform for 2022 and encouraged the Board to provide input regarding the development of 2023's efforts. Mr. David Blount, Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission (TJPDC), appeared before the Board to talk about potential legislative priorities for consideration. He touched on short term rentals and how there is proposed legislation that will restrict certain local authority on such activity. He noted the proposal was initiated by the proponents of short-term rental business.

Mr. Williams asked if the proposal is to limit the county's authority in making regulation on short-term rentals.

Mr. Blount said that is his understanding.

Mr. Adams asked if new regulations on short-term rentals imposed by the state invalidate existing local ordinances/regulations.

Mr. Blount said yes.

Discussion ensued regarding regional concerns about the responsibility of law enforcement when mental health crisis situations occur, and those individuals need to be transported to a hospital.

Mr. Blount said other localities have expressed the same concern.

NEW BUSINESS/ACTION ITEMS

Resolution – Supporting the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Grant Program

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) established the new Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) discretionary program with \$5 billion in appropriated funds over the next 5 years. The SS4A program funds regional, local, and Tribal initiatives through grants to prevent roadway deaths and serious injuries. Funds for the fiscal year 2022 SS4A grant program are to be awarded on a competitive basis to support planning, infrastructure, behavioral, and operational initiatives to prevent death and serious injury on roads and streets involving all roadway users, including pedestrians; bicyclists; public transportation, personal conveyance, and micromobility users; motorists; and commercial vehicle operators. The Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) for Safe Streets and Roads for All application deadline is open now through September 15, 2022, and award announcements are expected to be made by the end of calendar year 2022 or early 2023.

The Board of Supervisors feel that certain roadways and intersections in Louisa County could use safety improvements and benefit from the program.

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to authorize the County Administrator and staff to work with the Thomas Jefferson Planning District Commission (TJPDC) on supplemental planning efforts in identifying roadways that could benefit from the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Grant Program.

Resolution – Appointing Mrs. Kristin Hawk as the Chief of Fire and Emergency Medical Services and the Emergency Services Coordinator for the County of Louisa

To ensure adequate preparations for disasters or emergencies and to protect the public peace, health and safety of the County and to preserve the lives, property and economic well-being of the people, the County of Louisa created the Office of Emergency Services.

The Director of Emergency Services shall be the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors who, working in conjunction with the County Administrator and his staff, is responsible for organizing emergency services and directing emergency operations through the regularly constituted government structure.

The officers and personnel of all departments, offices and agencies are directed to cooperate with and extend such services and facilities to the Director upon request.

The Coordinator of Emergency Services activities is appointed by the Director of Emergency Services with the consent of the Board of Supervisors, and the County's Chief of Fire and Emergency Medical Services fulfills this role and is responsible for coordinating and administering emergency services operations in the County on a day-to-day basis.

Mrs. Kristin Hawk has been identified to be the most appropriate and qualified individual to fill the position of Chief of Fire and Emergency Medical Services and Emergency Services Coordinator.

On the motion of Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Barnes, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to appoint Mrs. Kristin Hawk as Chief of Fire and Emergency Medical Services for the County of Louisa and as the Emergency Services Coordinator for the County of Louisa.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

Resolution – To Approve Rezoning Application REZ2022-01, the Meadows Four Brothers, LLC

The Meadows Four Brothers, LLC. Owner; submitted a request for rezoning approximately 18 acres of tax map parcel 8-3 from Agricultural (A-1) to Agricultural (A-2), for the purpose of subdividing. The property has a total acreage of approximately 286 acres, located near the intersection of Porter Town Road (Route 704) and Red Hill Road (Route 660) in the Green Springs voting district. The 2040 Louisa County Comprehensive Plan designates this area of Louisa County as rural/agricultural, and it is not in a designated growth area.

The applicant is not proffering any by-right or conditional uses in the Agricultural (A-2) zone.

At a regular meeting of the Louisa County Planning Commission held July 14, 2022, the Planning Commission voted that the public necessity, convenience, general welfare, or good zoning practice compels it to make a recommendation of approval to the Louisa County Board of Supervisors on the request for rezoning approximately 18 acres of tax map parcel 8-3 from Agricultural (A-1) to Agricultural (A-2); with the stipulation that the Virginia Outdoors Foundation (VOF) be formally notified of the request prior to the Board of Supervisors meeting. This is due to the conservation easement VOF holds on the property.

Mr. Torrey Williams, Applicant's Agent, appeared before the Board to provide a brief overview of the request and the applicants' intent.

Back and forth discussion ensued regarding the request for rezoning and the subdivision of 18 acres, which were answered by Mr. Williams.

Mr. Adams opened the public hearing. With no one wishing to speak, Mr. Adams closed the public hearing and brought it back to the Board for discussion.

On the motion of Ms. Jones, seconded by Mr. Barnes, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to approve the request for rezoning of approximately 18 acres of tax map parcel 8-3 from Agricultural (A-1) to Agricultural (A-2) to allow for subdivision of the property, as presented with no changes.

Resolution – To Approve Rezoning Application REZ2022-02 & Special Exception, Hile

Gene and Sharon Hile Trustees, Owner; submitted a request for rezoning tax map parcel 15E-1-A2 from General Commercial (C-2) to General Residential (R-2), for the purpose of building a single family dwelling. The property has a total acreage of approximately 1.135 acres, located in the Cochran's Landing Subdivision on the northwest side of Route 522 (Zachary Taylor Hwy), across from Tim's at Lake Anna restaurant, in the Mineral voting district.

The 2040 Louisa County Comprehensive Plan designates this area of Louisa County as the Lake Anna growth area for low density residential. The applicant is not proffering any by-right or conditional uses in the Agricultural (A-2) zone. The applicant is also requesting a special exception from Section 86-196 - Minimum lot area. The minimum lot size requirement in the Residential General R-2 zoning district is 1.5 acres, and the subject property is 1.135 acres.

At a regular meeting of the Louisa County Planning Commission held August 11, 2022, the Planning Commission voted that the public necessity, convenience, general welfare, or good zoning practice compels it to make a recommendation of denial to the Louisa County Board of Supervisors on the request for rezoning approximately 1.135 acres identified as tax map parcel 15E-1-A2 from General Commercial (C-2) to General Residential (R-2).

Mr. Torrey Williams, Applicant's Agent, provided a brief overview of the request for rezoning to allow for a single-family dwelling.

Mr. Adams opened the public hearing. With no one wishing to speak, Mr. Adams closed the public hearing and brought it back to the Board for discussion.

On the motion of Mr. Barnes, seconded by Mr. Purcell, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to approve the request for rezoning of approximately 1.135 acres identified as tax map parcel 15E-1-A2 from General Commercial (C-2) to General Residential (R-2) to allow for a single family dwelling and a special exception from Section 86-196 - Minimum lot area.

Resolution – To Approve Rezoning Application REZ2022-03, the Louisa County IDA

The Louisa County IDA, Owner/Applicant; submitted a request for rezoning approximately 61.749 acres of tax map parcel 41-191 from Industrial (I-2) to Agricultural (A-2), to accommodate an agricultural operation engaged in year-round production of crops. The property is located south of the Louisa Airport, between Route 33 (Jefferson Hwy) and School Bus Road in the Louisa voting district. The 2040 Louisa County Comprehensive Plan designates this area

of Louisa County in the Louisa Growth Area designated for Industrial use. In accordance with DIVISION 2. - GROWTH AREA OVERLAYS, Sec. 86-104. - Purpose, intent and exceptions, the Louisa growth area showing mixed use and industrial uses is identified as being exempt from the additional architectural and site requirements for development in a designated Growth Area Overlay District. The applicant is proffering 15 by-right uses in the Agricultural (A-2) zone and 6 other conditions.

At a regular meeting of the Louisa County Planning Commission held August 11, 2022, the Planning Commission voted that the public necessity, convenience, general welfare, or good zoning practice compels it to make a recommendation of approval to the Louisa County Board of Supervisors on the request for rezoning tax map parcel 41-191 from Industrial (I-2) to Agricultural (A-2), to accommodate an agricultural operation; with the stipulation that the applicant engage and commit to working with the Louisa County High School on CTE co-op efforts prior to the BOS meeting and for the applicant to request a speed study or speed reduction for commercial traffic on School Bus Rd to 35MPH.

Mr. Andy Wade, Economic Development Director, talked briefly about the request for rezoning of approximately 62 acres to accommodate an agricultural operation.

Mr. Adams opened the public hearing.

Ms. Vicky Hart, Louisa District, appeared before the Board to express her concerns with uncontrolled project runoff and stabilization measures.

Mr. Ed Jarvis, Louisa County Airport Manager, talked about the importance of the project and the benefit to the community.

With no one else wishing to speak, Mr. Adams closed the public hearing and brought it back to the Board for discussion.

On the motion of Mr. Purcell, seconded by Mr. Barnes, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to approve the request for rezoning of approximately 61.749 acres of tax map parcel 41-191 from Industrial (I-2) to Agricultural (A-2) to accommodate an agricultural operation, with acceptance of the 7 proffers submitted by the applicant dated Revised August 1, 2022.

Resolution – Authorizing a through Truck Traffic Restriction on Chopping Road (Route 623)

In accordance with section 46.2-809 of the Code of Virginia, through trucks can be restricted on certain primary and secondary routes in the limited number of cases where doing so will promote the health, safety and welfare of the public without creating an undue hardship on any transportation users.

Such restriction may apply to any truck or truck and trailer or semitrailer combination, except a pickup or panel truck that has no point of origin or destination along the subject route.

The restriction of through truck, truck and trailer, or semi-trailer combination from using Chopping Road (Route 623). The recommended alternate route is Louisa Ave/Zachary Taylor Highway (US Route 623) and Mineral Ave/Davis Highway (US Route 22). The proposed

alternate route is approximately 6.41 miles, and additional 1.9 miles.

Mr. Adams opened the public hearing.

Mr. Ed Kube, Mineral District/Mineral Town Council, spoke in favor with the idea of a through truck restriction on Chopping Road (Route 623), but also expressed his concerns with the proposed alternative route that is to go through the Town of Mineral.

Mr. David Rogers, Mineral District, spoke in support of a through truck traffic restriction on Chopping Road (Route 623).

Mr. Ed Jarvis, Mineral District/Mineral Town Council, spoke in favor with the idea of a through truck restriction on Chopping Road (Route 623), but also expressed his concerns with the proposed alternative route that is to go through the Town of Mineral. He said VDOT will need to come up with a better solution for an alternative route.

Ms. Pam Harlowe, Mineral District, appeared before the board and expressed her concerns with the proposed alternative route on through truck traffic restriction that is to go through the Town of Mineral.

Mr. Donald Thurston, Mineral District, spoke in support of a through truck traffic restriction on Chopping Road (Route 623).

Mr. Scott Thornton, Louisa Residency Administrator, VDOT, stated if the Board chooses to proceed by resolution with any of the requests, they will forward the information to the district traffic engineering for review and consideration.

With no one else wishing to speak, Mr. Adams closed the public hearing and brought it back to the Board for discussion.

On the motion of Mr. Gentry, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to request the Virginia Department of Transportation to implement a through truck restriction on Chopping Road (Route 623).

Resolution – Authorizing a through Truck Traffic Restriction on Chalklevel Road (Route 625) and Mansfield Road (Route 613)

In accordance with section 46.2-809 of the Code of Virginia, through trucks can be restricted on certain primary and secondary routes in the limited number of cases where doing so will promote the health, safety and welfare of the public without creating an undue hardship on any transportation users.

Such restriction may apply to any truck or truck and trailer or semitrailer combination, except a pickup or panel truck that has no point of origin or destination along the subject route.

The restriction of through truck, truck and trailer, or semi-trailer combination from using Chalklevel Road (Route 625) and Mansfield (Route 613). The recommended alternate route is Louisa Ave/Zachary Taylor Highway (US Route 522) and Mineral Ave/Davis Highway (US Route 22). The proposed alternate route is approximately 8.5 miles, and additional 0.6 miles.

Mr. Adams opened the public hearing. With no one wishing to speak, Mr. Adams closed the public hearing and brought it back to the Board for discussion.

On the motion of Mr. Gentry, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to request the Virginia Department of Transportation to implement a through truck restriction on Chalklevel Road (Route 625) and Mansfield (Route 613). Any necessary improvements to the alternate route will need to be made before the restriction can be put into place.

Resolution – Authorizing a through Truck Traffic Restriction on Shannon Hill Road (Route 605)

In accordance with section 46.2-809 of the Code of Virginia, through trucks can be restricted on certain primary and secondary routes in the limited number of cases where doing so will promote the health, safety and welfare of the public without creating an undue hardship on any transportation users. Such restriction may apply to any truck or truck and trailer or semitrailer combination, except a pickup or panel truck that has no point of origin or destination along the subject route.

The restriction of through truck, truck and trailer, or semi-trailer combination from using Shannon Hill Road (Route 605) from Route 33 to 5821 Shannon Hill Road. The recommended alternate route is Interstate 64, Courthouse Road (Route 208), and Jefferson Highway (Route 33). The proposed alternate route is approximately 20.9 miles an additional 12.4 miles.

Mr. Adams opened the public hearing.

Ms. Mary Kranz, Mountain Road District, spoke in favor of the through truck traffic restriction on Shannon Hill Road (Route 605).

Ms. Sara Macel, Mountain Road District, spoke in favor of the through truck traffic restriction on Shannon Hill Road (Route 605).

Mr. John Disosway, Mineral District, spoke in favor of the through truck traffic restriction on Shannon Hill Road (Route 605)

With no one else wishing to speak, Mr. Adams closed the public hearing and brought it back to the Board for discussion.

Mr. Adams stated the restriction on Route 605 from I-64 ends at 5821 Shannon Hill Road. He noted the address is the future site of the Shannon Hill Business Park. He explained such restriction does not apply for trucks that have a point of origin or destination along the subject route, and in most cases, trucks that will utilize Route 605 will more than likely be trucks for the business park, loggers, or delivery trucks along the subject route.

Mr. Thornton, Louisa Residency Administrator, VDOT, stated any necessary improvements to the alternate route will need to be made before the restriction can be put into place.

On the motion of Mr. Gentry, seconded by Mr. Williams, which carried by a vote of 7-0, the Board voted to request the Virginia Department of Transportation to implement a through truck restriction on Shannon Hill Road (Route 605) from Route 33 to 5821 Shannon Hill Road
